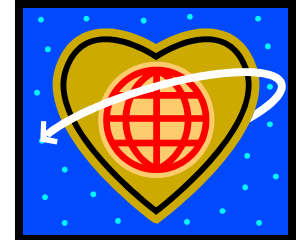

Meet the Presenters

Carol Scarborough. Carol is a teacher who is a parishioner at St. Francis', San Antonio. This is her first time to be part of the World Missions Seminar, and we welcome her outstanding gift of music.

The Rev. David Chalk. David has been rector of St James, Del Rio, for more than 8 years, and has brought many mission teams from around the country to work at the Border as well as having been on many mission trips himself. He believes that Christ calls all the baptized to respond to the Good News and that the Holy Spirit's gifts empower and equip the faithful to minister in our own neighborhoods as well as to the ends of the earth.

The Rev. Ned Bowersox. Ned is immediate past rector of Church of the Good Shepherd, Corpus. He has been the catalyst for the amazing growth of world missions at COGS and has personally led numerous mission teams.

Caroline and Curt Mowen. Curt's passion for mission work has been focused on the Water Ministry in both Honduras and Mexico . He has led several teams to Honduras and serves on the Water Mission Board. Caroline is currently on the Outreach Committee at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, San Antonio, and recently got back from a mission trip to Belarus where the current missionary program was reviewed and additional support identified.

Sarah and Amy Lillibridge, Amy and Emily Paschal, Sarah and Rachel Willcox. These young women, three sets of sisters, are in high school and college. Their combined missions experience is vast and varied, and for some of them,

this is a passion that began in elementary school years. St. David's, San Antonio, is the girls' church home.

Betty Chumney. Betty facilitates diocesan missions as the Bishop's Director for World Missions. Not only did she formalize the initial diocesan world missions program, but she has traveled extensively for missions ministries.

Patricia Perea. As part of the *Manos* team, Patricia has seen ministry in Honduras grow to encompass construction, scholarships, micro enterprise, and addressing physical needs.

Tom Hardin. Tom is a life-long Episcopalian who grew up in the Diocese of West Texas. He is currently a member of Christ Church, San Antonio, and has been active in that parish's foreign mission efforts for over 10 years, making multiple mission trips to Russia and Mexico.

The Rev. James Murguia. Throughout his 10 years in the priesthood James has experienced the significant grace of God through short-term mission trips in Central America. It is both his opinion and experience that vital ministry at the congregational level is directly related to providing individuals opportunities for transformation. This is to say that a congregation's missionary zeal determines the health of its ministry.

The Rev. Chip Prehn. The Rev. W.L. Prehn is Assistant Rector and Chaplain of St. Luke's Episcopal Church and School, San Antonio, Texas, a parish that has been instrumental to dynamic mission initiatives in Honduras (the Water Ministry) and Northern Mexico (Monterrey and Piedras Negras) in recent years. Chip also has a special interest in education and is hoping to see more mission schools established in areas where he is sure they will have a huge impact on the life of the people.
